SECTION NEWS



AAUW ESTABLISHING PRIORITIES

AAUW is in the process of establishing priorities for the organization moving forward. The officers recently received a questionnaire asking if the current policies should be kept, revised or deleted. Here is a sampling of those priorities.



Priority A – To achieve economic self-sufficiency for all women

- Pay equity, fairness in compensation and benefits, and economic justice.
- Equitable access and advancement in employment, through vigorous enforcement of employment antidiscrimination statutes, including age discrimination.
- Polices that support work-life balance, including medical leave, family leave, quality and affordable child and dependent care.

Priority B – To support a strong system of high-quality public education

- Vigorous enforcement of federal Title IX and all other federal and California civil rights laws pertaining to education.
- Protection of programs that meet the needs of girls and women in all levels of education and fields of study, including sexual health education and athletics.

Priority C – To guarantee equality, individual rights, and social justice for a diverse and inclusive society, AAUW advocates

- Vigorous enforcement of and full access to civil and constitutional rights, including affirmative action and expanding voting rights
- Self-determination of one's reproductive health decisions
- Universal access to quality, affordable health care and comprehensive family planning services, including expansion of patients' rights


Latinas and the Pay Gap

November Webinar: Status of Latinas in the U.S.

October 29 is Latina Equal Pay Day. Because of the gender pay gap, Latinas were compensated 55% of what non-Hispanic white men were paid in 2019. That means it takes Latina workers almost an entire extra year of full-time, year-round work to be paid the average annual earnings of white men.
