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

### Kay Caligiuri

Kathleen (Kay) Mary Caligiuri: October 2, 1927 - December 21, 2020

Kathleen was born in Duluth, Minnesota. She was raised in Hibbing, Minnesota from the age of three and made many lifelong friends there.

The family moved to Los Angeles where Kathleen graduated from UCLA and began teaching for LA City Schools. She and John O. Caligiuri

married in 1952 and moved to Merced in 1963. Kathleen taught at Charles Wright School in Merced where she met her long-time lunch bunch friends.

Family gatherings and holidays were always fun times for Kathleen and she enjoyed traveling hiking, reading and being with friends.

Kay was preceded in death by her husband of 53 years, John O. Caligiuri and her parents, Earl and Jean McDonald.

She is survived by sons John, Jim, Jeff (Karen) and daughter Mary, grandsons Gabe (Tish) and Dylan, and 7 great grandchildren.

### Leone Mc Laughlin



Leone Sherwin (nee McLaughlin) was born at home on the outskirts of Eugene, Oregon on January 12, 1920. She was the youngest of three with two older brothers. When she was a toddler the family moved to Tennant, a logging community in northern California. This was a company town with 100 homes, all exactly alike. There was a school, a church, general store, nurse's station, and dorm for the single loggers. Leone grew up in the woods and remarked that she guessed they were poor but didn't know it as everyone lived in the same circumstances. Though brought up in the backwoods, her mother, a teacher, and her father made sure their home was always full of literature and music. Graduating high school with a class of 3 students insured that Leone had many opportunities to be involved in every activity and gave her the confidence to enroll at San Jose State.

In her senior year of college World War II started. She remembers entire fraternities enlisting the day after Pearl Harbor was bombed. Blackouts were common and she was lucky enough to have a walk-in closet with a light in it where she and her roommates could sit on the floor and study. After graduating she returned to northern California and began teaching in McCloud. There was no housing available so she, along with 6 other new young teachers, all rented rooms in the McCloud hotel. They had a blast!

Seeking a little more adventure, the following year she set off on a train with a friend to find a new job and landed in Oxnard. It seemed an ideal place to teach as there was a very large naval port there with lots of sailors!! She soon hooked up with a handsome young man from San Luis Obispo.

At the end of the war, they were married and she began her life in San Luis where she would live for 55 years. Her father would come to San Luis to build their home which they would live in until moving to Merced in 1999. Leone and her husband, Roy, would be active in many community organizations, especially those that did projects to help those in need and to better the community. She had two children, Danny and Jane, and always was involved in their activities, from Boy Scouts to Rainbow.

She would return to teaching when her children were in elementary school and teach for 24 years. She and Roy loved to travel and managed to visit all the continents except Antarctica. A favorite trip was the one they took to Africa on their own where they attended a wedding in Zambia and experienced many beautiful and unique places.

Roy's declining health brought them to Merced in 1999 to be close to daughter, Jane. Though arriving in a new town at 79, Leone came with exuberance and a positive attitude and immediately became involved in her church, AAUW and PEO. Through her family and these organizations, she met many wonderful new friends who have helped to make her life joyful and meaningful. This January she celebrated her 101st birthday with a drive by parade. She was thrilled and sends out a big thank you to all her participated.








### **SECTION NEWS**
