APRIL PROGRAM RECAP

We had a fabulous program with Stephanie Dietz last night! Stephanie shared a lot of information about what



is happening in the City. So please take a look at the recording so you can enjoy the information she shared. After the presentation, she also addressed a very important topic. What do you do about all of those old

batteries? Please do not throw them in the trash – instead here is the solution to pollution!

In California batteries are not disposed of, they are considered to be a household hazardous waste and a potential fire hazard for our drivers and the landfill and need to be recycled.

Recycling options depend on the type of battery.

Regular Alkaline (or one time use) batteries are accepted at the landfill scale house year around for recycling.

Rechargeable batteries can be recycled at Lowe's or Home Depot and at the landfill.

Car batteries or lead acid batteries can usually go to recycling centers or point-of-purchase, they have a core fee that can be refunded.

If a resident does not want to go out to the landfill, there are mail options they can use for a fee.

FROM NATIONAL AAUW

May 5th is the date that mothers have to work into 2021 to finally reach the pay fathers took home last year.

As we mark both Mom's Equal Pay Day and Mother's Day itself this week, we honor that all moms are essential. The COVID-19 crisis has exacerbated economic inequalities we've long known to be a harm to women, and the impact flows to their families. One in four women reported leaving the workforce for lack of child care during the pandemic, and 1.5 million mothers are reported to still be missing from the workforce.

While May 5th represents moms on average, the racial disparity present between working moms deserves notice. Compared to every dollar made by white, non-Hispanic fathers:

- Latina mothers are paid \$0.46.
- Native American mothers are paid \$0.50.
- Black mothers are paid \$0.52.
- White, non-Hispanic mothers are paid \$0.71.
- Asian American and Pacific Islander mothers are paid \$0.90.

All workplace discrimination is dangerous and hurts our nation's workers and families. Here is where you come in. Today, we ask you to take two immediate actions on behalf of mothers and pregnant workers:

- 1. Ensure equal pay for equal work. The Paycheck Fairness Act would update and strengthen the Equal Pay Act of 1963 and help close the gender pay gap for everyone.
- 2. Protect pregnant workers. The Pregnant Workers Fairness Act would require reasonable health accommodations and provide protections against workplace discrimination for mothers and all pregnant workers.

Mothers and pregnant workers cannot wait. Congress must now move both of these bills forward to ensure all women and workers have the tools they need to challenge discrimination and all employers have the incentives and supports they need to comply with the law. To make equality a reality, we need you.

Mark both Mom's Equal Pay Day and Mother's Day by protecting working moms and all pregnant workers — act now!

EXECUTIVE AND AGENCY ACTIONS

The U.S. Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights announced on April 6 that it will conduct a comprehensive review of the Department's regulations implementing Title IX. This will include gathering public input on the issue of sexual harassment in school environments. It also announced efforts to make it easier for eligible students to get their educational loans forgiven under the Total and Permanent Disability (TPD) discharge program.

In addition, President Biden signed several important executive actions.

- On March 31, he signed "A Proclamation on National Sexual Assault Prevention and Awareness Month, 2021" to honor sexual assault survivors and recommit to creating a society where all people have an opportunity to thrive without fear of abuse or assault.
- That same day, he signed "A Proclamation on Transgender Day of Visibility, 2021," which recognizes the generations of struggle, activism and courage that have brought our country closer to full equality for transgender and gender non-binary people in the United States.
- On March 24, President Biden signed "A Proclamation on National Equal Pay Day, 2021," reaffirming the administration's commitment to ensuring equal pay for low-wage workers, working families, and all women.
