PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Welcome fellow university women to AAUW 2022-2023. This year I have picked, as a theme, "Women in Power". It is time we took our power back. I want to study powerful women, hear from them, learn about them, and be inspired for our work ahead.

What does a powerful woman look like? How do we know a woman is powerful? I have been pondering these questions since taking on the job of president. Certainly, it is a way of being, like unstoppable, persistent, courageous, or determined. Sometimes we call them "Leaders"

The most remarkable, powerful woman I have known was a coworker at Modesto Junior College. She had a Ph.D. in Psychology and was teaching Psych 01. And she was paralyzed from the waist down and used a very old wheelchair, not one of those electric ones. She pushed herself. In 1980 buildings were not very accessible and her students would meet her in the parking lot and help her up the curb. She was a fantastic role model for the students, since in those days we didn't see disabled people a lot.

How had she succeeded? How come she was in a wheelchair? She would always tell her story. She was in a car

accident in 1937 when she was a senior in college at the University of Wisconsin, hlt by a drunk driver on her way home to Buffalo for Christmas break. When her father got the call, they told him she was dead and would he please come to identify her. She was not the woman in the morgue. The doctor told him that there was another woman from the accident who was upstairs in critical condition who had broken her back and would soon be dying. This turned out to be his daughter and despite the doctor's prediction she kept living.

Her father finally took her home to Buffalo to recover in a makeshift hospital bed in the living room. She never died but lay for ten years as an invalid. She couldn't go on living like this, so she told her mother she was going to wheelchair school to learn to care for herself, drive a car and get her college degree. When she enrolled in the University of Buffalo, she changed her major to psychology and started over. After obtaining her master's degree at Buffalo, she enrolled at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor to get her Ph.D. While in her internship in Memphis Tennessee, she met her husband who was in his last year of residency in Pathology. They married and were pregnant in 3 months. Surely, she would die now, as no paralyzed woman had ever given birth. She finished her Ph.D. lying in bed with her newborn beside her.

He wanted to practice medicine in Hawaii, so off they went, baby on her lap, despite her parents and the airlines disapproval. Remarkably, she had four more children. She was 45 years old when she had her last child, a boy with Down Syndrome. They had to move back to the mainland to get him services. She was named by the Stanislaus County Association for Retarded Children to be the district director of the California Council for Retarded Children. She also worked for the Modesto Family Service Agency, as a counselor, and at the State hospital.

If you haven't already guessed, this persistent, courageous, determined woman was my mother, Dorothy Chappell, 1916-1986. She taught me everything I know about being powerful.

SCHOLARSHIP NEWS


