PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hello fellow AAUW members. March 21st was International Down Syndrome Day. That's a special day at our house because we have Steve. He is my youngest brother. Steve was born in Hawaii on August 4th, 1961, the same day and the same hospital as Barack Obama. We say it's his claim to fame and perhaps they were switched at birth.

Steve came to live with me and my daughter, Karly, when my parents died. I told the other siblings I would try it out for 5 years and ended up having him for 30 years. When I retired, Steve went to visit each of the siblings for 3 months at a time. It was very hard for his caseworker to understand that our family wanted to share caregiving.

Now, Steve has developed dementia and has gone to live with my daughter in Merced. I help with the grands when she is doing stuff with her children. We make a good team. She is a Registered Nurse and can care for him now that he has had some heart failure and a seizure. He was hospitalized for three days this month when he had his first seizure. He can no longer do any self-care. The average lifespan for a person with Down Syndrome is 60 years old. This year Steve turned 61 and is showing signs of Dementia. 50% of Down Syndrome people develop Alzheimer's disease. Research is being done now on the connection with the extra chromosome #21 that Steve has. This chromosome plays a key role in the relationship between Down syndrome and Alzheimer's disease as it carries a gene that produces one of the key proteins, amyloid protein,

involved with changes in the brain that causes Alzheimer's.
