April Program





Many of you contacted AAUW National to express your concern regarding the yellow postcards our members received from AAUW National. You may know the project

as the "Data Verification project," "Oral History Project," or simply as the "Yellow Postcards."

We took your feedback seriously and have worked with AAUW National to make the following changes:

All messages (emails, postcards etc) to California members will be suppressed going forward.

AAUW National is very concerned that members may have felt pressured into purchasing items. Each California member who purchased an item or package will be contacted to confirm that they wanted to place their order. If not, they will be assisted in canceling the order and obtaining a refund.

Please share this information with your branch members and note that it may take a few days to turn off the messaging. If you or your members already received a survey from PCI, the third-party vendor that National used for this project, feel free to share your observations about the process with them directly with confidence that it will be shared with AAUW National.

FAMILY ACT AND HEALTHY FAMILIES ACT

This week, Congress reintroduced two bills that would have great impact on women in the workforce: the Family and Medical Insurance Leave (FAMILY) Act and the Healthy Families Act.

Women disproportionately bear the economic opportunity cost of providing care for children or elderly family members or doing things like taking them to the doctor. Yet unlike the majority of developed countries worldwide, the United States does not guarantee paid annual leave, paid time off for illness or family care, or paid parental leave. This results in many women putting off seeking health care for themselves because they cannot take time off work, affecting their abilities as employees and primary caregivers.

Urge your members of Congress to support the FAMILY Act and Healthy Families Act to finally provide the support American workers need trying to meet the demands of work and life. While Congress took steps during the pandemic to provide broader access to emergency leave, it soon expired and millions are back at square one. Access to paid leave should never expire.
